Staff and pupils are made aware of the process for removing face coverings when pupils and staff who use them arrive at school, and this is communicated clearly to parents and staff. The Staff and Volunteer Confidentiality Policy and Pupil Confidentiality Policy are followed at all times – this includes withholding the names of staff, volunteers and pupils with either confirmed or suspected cases of coronavirus.

Minimise contact with individuals who are unwell with COVID-19 symptoms		<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Staff and other adults do not come into the school if they have coronavirus (COVID-19) symptoms, or have tested positive in the last 10 days, and anyone developing those symptoms during the school day is sent home. If anyone in the school becomes unwell with a new, continuous cough or a high temperature, or has a loss of, or change in, their normal sense of taste or smell (anosmia), they are sent home and advised to follow 'stay at home: guidance for households with possible or confirmed coronavirus (COVID-19) infection', which sets out that they must self-isolate for at least 10 days and should arrange to have a test to see if they have coronavirus (COVID-19). Other members of their household (including any siblings) should self-isolate for 10 days from when the symptomatic person first had symptoms. If a child is awaiting collection, they are moved, where possible, to a room where they can be isolated behind a closed door, depending on the age and needs of the child, with appropriate adult supervision if required. The bathroom must be cleaned and disinfected using standard cleaning products before being used by anyone else. • Everyone will wash their hands thoroughly for 20 seconds with soap and running water or use hand sanitiser after any contact with someone who is unwell. The area around the person with symptoms must be cleaned with normal household disinfectant after they have left to reduce the risk of passing the infection on to other people. See the <u>COVID-19: cleaning of non-healthcare settings guidance</u>. • PPE will be worn by staff caring for the child while they await collection if a distance of 2 metres cannot be maintained (such as for a very young child or a child with complex needs). Children in primary school do not need to wear a face covering. Transparent face coverings, which may assist communication with someone who relies on lip reading, clear sound or facial expression to communicate, can also be worn. Face visors or shields should not be worn as an alternative to face coverings. They may protect against droplet spread in specific circumstances but are unlikely to be effective in reducing aerosol transmission when used without an additional face covering. 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		<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Staff working with pupils who spit uncontrollably may want more opportunities to wash their hands than other staff. • Pupils who use saliva as a sensory stimulant or who struggle with 'catch it, bin it, kill it' may also need more opportunities to wash their hands. • Continue to help pupils with complex needs to clean their hands properly. • Frequent and thorough hand cleaning should now be regular practice. • Ensure there is enough hand washing or hand sanitiser stations available so that all pupils and staff can clean their hands regularly • Supervise hand sanitiser use given the risks around ingestion – skin friendly skin cleaning wipes can be used as an alternative • Building these routines into school culture, supported by behaviour expectations and helping ensure younger pupils and those with complex needs understand the need to follow them

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<p>Prevention</p> <p>6. Minimise contact</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> The number of contacts between pupils and staff is reduced. This is achieved through keeping groups separate (in 'Bubbles') and through maintaining distance between individuals. The balance between the Bubbles and social distancing is based on: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Pupils ability to distance; The layout of the school site; The feasibility of keeping distinct groups separate while offering a broad curriculum <p>More information on groups can be found in COVID-19: Guidance for full opening</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> If staff or pupils cannot maintain distancing, particularly with younger pupils, the risk is reduced by keeping pupils in smaller class sized groups. All teachers and other staff can operate across different classes and year groups in order to facilitate the delivery of the school timetable. Where staff need to move between classes and year groups, they should try and keep their distance from pupils and other staff as much as they can, ideally 2 metres from other adults. Supply teachers, peripatetic teachers and/or other temporary staff can move between schools. They should ensure they minimise contact and maintain as much distance as possible from other staff. 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		<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Pupils are seated side by side and facing forwards, rather than face to face or side on. • Large gatherings such as assemblies are avoided, and groups kept apart. • The timetable is revised to implement where possible: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Plan for lessons or activities which keep groups apart and movement around the school site to a minimum; • Maximise the number of lessons or classroom activities which could take place outdoors; • Break times (including lunch) are staggered so that all pupils are not moving around the school at the same time; • Drop-off and collection times are staggered and communicated to parents; • Parents' drop-off and pick-up protocols are planned and communicated so that they minimise adult to adult contact and remind them not to gather at gates and come onto the site without an appointment. • Pupils use the same classroom or defined area of a setting throughout the day, with a thorough cleaning of the rooms at the end of the day. Separate staffrooms provided for each year group • Visitors to the site, such as contractors, local authority employees and health employees to be fully briefed on the school's arrangements and follow site guidance on physical distancing and hygiene on or before arrival. Where visits can happen outside of school hours, they should. A record will be kept of all visitors. • Classroom based resources, such as books and games, are used and shared within the Bubble; these are cleaned regularly, along with all frequently touched surfaces. Further information on music teaching in schools is available in the COVID-19 – guidance for full opening. • Where schools are unable to put on live performances to parents, they may wish to consider alternatives such as the use of live streaming and recording, subject to the usual safeguarding considerations and parental permission. • Schools in other local restriction tier areas planning an indoor or outdoor performance in front of an audience should follow the latest advice in the DCMS performing arts guidance, implementing events in the lowest risk order as described. Keep occupied spaces well ventilated</p>		<p>operation, it is important to ensure it is well ventilated and a comfortable teaching environment is maintained. These can be achieved by a variety of measures including:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ mechanical ventilation systems – these should be adjusted to increase the ventilation rate wherever possible and checked to confirm that normal operation meets current guidance and that only fresh outside air is circulated. If possible, systems should be adjusted to full fresh air or, if not, then systems should be operated as normal as long as they are within a single room and supplemented by an outdoor air supply ○ natural ventilation – opening windows (in cooler weather windows should be opened just enough to provide constant background ventilation and opened more fully during breaks to purge the air in the space). Opening internal doors can also assist with creating a throughput of air ○ natural ventilation – if necessary external opening doors may also be used (as long as they are not fire doors and where safe to do so) <u>The Health and Safety Executive guidance on air conditioning and ventilation during the coronavirus outbreak and CIBSE coronavirus (COVID-19) advice</u> provides more information. ○ To balance the need for increased ventilation while maintaining a comfortable temperature, consider: ○ opening high level windows in colder weather in preference to low level to reduce draughts ○ increasing the ventilation while spaces are unoccupied (for example, between classes, during break and lunch, when a room is unused)

Staff and pupils must not come into the school if they have symptoms and must be sent home to self-isolate if they develop them in school. All pupils can be tested, including children under 5, but children aged 11 and under will need to be helped by their parents/carers if using a home testing kit ○ provide details of anyone they have been in close contact with if they were to test positive for coronavirus (COVID-19) or if asked by NHS Test & Trace ○ <u>self-isolate</u> if they have been in close contact with someone who develops coronavirus (COVID-19) symptoms or someone who tests positive for coronavirus (COVID-19) • A small number of home testing kits available to be given directly to parents/carers collecting a child who has developed symptoms at school or staff who have developed symptoms at schools, where providing a test will increase the likelihood of them getting tested. • Anyone who displays symptoms of coronavirus (COVID-19) can and should get a test. Tests can be booked online through the NHS <u>testing and tracing for coronavirus</u> website, or ordered by telephone via NHS 119 for those without access to the internet. Essential workers, which includes anyone involved in education or childcare, have priority access to testing. • The school will ask parents and staff to inform them immediately of the result of the test: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ If someone tests negative, if they feel well and no longer have symptoms similar to COVID-19 they can stop self-isolating. 				
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		<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ If someone test positive they should follow the '<u>stay at home: guidance for households with possible or confirmed coronavirus (COVID-19) infection</u>' and must continue to self-isolate for at least 10 days from the onset of their symptoms and then return to school only if they do not have symptoms other than cough or loss of sense of smell/taste. This is because a cough or anosmia can last for several weeks once the infection has gone. Other members of their household should continue self-isolating for the full 10 days. 				
Response to infection 11. Managing confirmed COVID-19 cases		<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Flowchart school response to suspected or confirmed COVID-19 cases to be followed for suspected or confirmed cases. • Schools should contact the DfE Helpline on 0800 046 8687 and select option 1 for advice on the action to take in response to a positive case. Schools will be put through to a team of advisers who will inform them of what action is needed based on the latest public health advice. If, following triage, further expert advice is required the adviser will escalate the school's call to the local health protection team.
